RYLA WITH A TWIST: H.R. ROTARACTORS ORGANISE A LEADERSHIP CAMP FOR INTERACTORS

Members of the Rotaract Club of H.R. College put on their thinking caps when confronted with the aphorism – “the children of today will be the leaders of tomorrow and nurturing children in the right way today is vital if we wish to have far-sighted and pro-active leaders in future”.

Working in tandem with the Rotary Club of Bombay, the Rotaractors decided to do something to ensure a bright future for all.

One bright idea that appealed to them was to focus on the all-round development of the youngest constituents of the Rotary movement. This quickly coalesced into an even brighter idea, viz., organising an inter-active event designed on the lines of RYLA (Rotary Youth Leadership Awards) for Interactors under the banner of the Rotary Club.

[As members are aware, RYLA is mainly for Rotaractors and recognises leadership, citizenship and personal growth and aims to (a) demonstrate Rotary’s respect and concern for youth, (b) provide an effective training experience for selected youth and potential leaders, (c) encourage leadership of youth by youth, and (d) recognise publicly young people who are rendering service to their communities.]

Soon, the Rotaractors of H.R. College started working on their first venture in this direction. They christened it “Fusion 2010 – To create leaders for a better tomorrow” and planned it as a vigorous two-day event with both indoor and outdoor components.

The event was held on March 6 and 7, first in the salubrious surroundings of the Sanjay Gandhi National Park at Borivli and then at their own H.R. College of Commerce and Economics.

Several outdoor activities were slated for the first day, with the tasks designed in such a way as to stress the importance of co-operation and to be performed by teams of ten to eleven Interactors drawn from different Interact Clubs.

The tasks assigned were almost impossible to complete without the co-operation of all members and thus fostered a feeling of team work. All members had to respect the opinions of others, sacrifice personal ambition for a better team result and learn how

to put their point across forcefully so that it was considered.

Apart from other considerations, the tasks were highly physical and thus stimulated personnel management and division of work in order to obtain optimum results.

On the second day, the focus was on grooming the mind. Sessions by two speakers were arranged, one by Mr. Karim Hajee (an entrepreneur) on human resources, and the other by Mr. Ayaz Khan (an actor) on acting as an off-beat career option.

Several interactive games were also on the menu, as were mind and management tasks that were meant to sharpen the participants’ wits.

The day ended with a valedictory ceremony at which the Interactors who had displayed their talent during the two-day project were acknowledged.

A total of 107 Interactors drawn from Sir J.J. Boys’ High School, Sir J.J. High Girls’ School, Bharda High School, St. Xavier’s High School, Scholar High School and Holy Name High School took part in the first-ever **Fusion 2010** programme.

Most of the participants displayed outstanding abilities and the organisers felt reassured about a bright future.

Interactor Dhvanil Mandalia of Scholar High School was selected for the Best Leader Award. Interactor Hussain from St. Xavier’s Boys’ High School and Interactor Rachana Dinesh Mistry

from Sir J.J. Girls’ High School received awards for their outstanding performance.

The main motive of the project was achieved when it was seen that the Interactors had learnt a lot not only about Interact but also about the Rotary and Rotaract movements. Besides, they had enjoyed themselves thoroughly, made many new friends, discovered several new facts and also learnt how to compete in the true spirit of interaction.

The Rotaractors of H.R. College deserve to be complimented on undertaking a path-breaking trek into uncharted waters.

As they themselves put it, they were guided by the wisdom of Andre Gide who said “One does not discover new lands without consenting to lose sight of the shore for a very long time”.

OVER 500 GATHER AT PRIYADARSHINI PARK FOR 'PRERNA 2010'

Prerma, an athletic meet for intellectually impaired children who many believe are special gifts from God, was held at Priyadarshini Park on February 16.

The event is organised by the Rotaract Club of H.R. College and sponsored every year with loving care and dedication by Mr. S.R. Mehta of Sumeet Foundation.

With about 25 schools for special children taking part, *Sumeet Foundation's Prerna 2010* saw active participation by over 360 students and another 150 and odd teachers and relatives. Thus, 500 people from all over Bombay descended on Priyadarshini Park on that day.

The danger of global warming was the theme for this year's event; the children used select "props" during certain races in order to propagate the message.

School girls beat college students at $E = mc^2$

While prizes were awarded to 108 winners and runners-up, consolation prizes were given to all the participants.

The students and their teachers were transported to the venue and back through a well-organised transport system put in place by the Rotaractors.

Some of the Rotaractors said before returning home, "It was a day when we spread smiles on their faces as well as on our own tired but happy faces".

'Saaz', a singing contest for blind students

An *antakshri* competition, "Saaz", was organised recently for students of the Victoria Memorial School for the Blind by the Rotaract Club of H.R. College. The Rotaractors were impressed by the "awesome" performance of the students.

A total of 15 teams participated in the contest which saw the level of difficulty increasing with each round. Various variations of cues were employed in an attempt to test the participants, but most of them emerged with flying colours.

In the final round, each team was given a letter and had to sing as many songs beginning with that letter as possible. Their memory was also tested and the Rotaractors were surprised to note that they had an exceptional memory for songs.

The first three winners were given prizes by Romeeta Sukhtankar, the Vice-President of the Rotaract Club. The audience cheered and encouraged all the participants and applauded the winners of the competition.

Valentine's Day, milk, drugs and the children of construction workers

President Pratik Kajaria and the members of the Rotaract Club of Hinduja College devoted an entire week to Community Service during the month of February.

The Club called its programme "Aashayen" and spent the week making visits, planting trees, spreading social awareness and attempting to bring smiles on the faces of the underprivileged.

A lot of advance planning and effort went into arranging all the projects that were taken up. Here is a brief description of the commendable activities undertaken during the "Aashayen" campaign by the Rotaract Club of Hinduja College.

Valentine's Day celebration at Vijaywadi home for the aged

Although a day late, the members of the Rotaract Club of Hinduja College went to the Vijaywadi home for the aged to celebrate Valentine's Day with its residents on February 15.

After wishing them a "Happy Valentine's Day", the Rotaractors distributed roses to all of them and sat down to chat and make them feel comfortable.

They screened the popular Hindi film, *Lage Raho Munnabhai*, which each one of the residents enjoyed thoroughly.

The Rotaractors bid them goodbye when it was time for them to have their dinner.

Say 'No' to addiction

Between February 15 and 19, the Hinduja Rotaractors visited four to five schools where they enacted their skit against drug addiction.

They started with Fazlani International School where they gave a performance at the school assembly at 7.45 am. The children watched the skit closely and in silence.

So impressed was the Principal, that he requested the Rotaractors to enact their play once again for the benefit of another batch of students. The Rotaractors happily did so.

Later during the week, the skit was enacted at St. Xavier's High School, St. Mary's High School, Diamond Jubilee High School and Gloria Convent High School.

It was appreciated by the staff and students at all the schools and left a deep impact on them.

Adopt a tree

The Rotaractors utilised their visits to various places where they presented the skit against drug addiction to promote tree plantation and adoption.

They planted trees at all the schools they visited after making a brief presentation on the importance of plants in one's day-to-day life. They also attempted to convince the youth to adopt trees, to treat them as friends and to care for them.

At most schools the gardeners became allies of the Rotaractors and demonstrated how to plant saplings. Several children soiled their hands and planted the remaining saplings.

Indian plants with different medicinal properties were planted at most of the schools.

Potted plants were presented to the residents of the Vijaywadi home for the aged and were helped in hanging the pots outside their windows.

Aroha

This two-day event (on February 17 and 18) was organised by the NSS unit of Hinduja College and encompassed a wide range of activities.

The Rotaractors took active part in almost all the events, such as rangoli-making, essay writing, poster-making, social photography and so on.

A seminar on "Drug Addiction" was also held as part of "Aroha" and the Rotaractors who attended found it to be extremely educative and informative.

Students from other colleges streamed in on the second day when, among other things, a "Box Cricket" match was organised on the college premises.

The Rotaractors presented their own skit against drug addiction at the competition for street plays organised on the occasion.

Industrial visit to Aarey Milk Factory

This was a joint project along with the Interactors of Fazlani International School.

The Interactors and Rotaractors assembled at the school at 8.45 am on February 19 and boarded a bus that took them along with 32 children from the Salaam Balak Trust, an NGO, to the Aarey Milk Factory at Worli.

Snacks were freely distributed to all children on the bus which dropped them at their destination at 10 am.

An official of the factory took the group under his charge and acted as guide. He took them to all the sections of the factory, such as pasteurisation, processing, packing and washing, and explained all the processes in detail.

The children heard him with rapt attention and had a great time seeing the various processes to which milk was subjected before it reached the market.

As the visit drew to an end, the children were given sweetened Energy milk to quench their thirst and uplift their spirits.

By 12 noon the children were safely back at their home, the Salaam Balak Trust NGO.

The Rotaractors thanked the Interactors of Fazlani School who had been of assistance during the visit.

Little angels

This was an unusual project in more ways than one.

First, it involved a visit to a construction site; second, it meant interacting with the unkempt and uncared for children of construction workers; and third, it required the Rotaractors to think on their feet and come up with innovative ideas to get their message across.

Working in association with "Mumbai Mobile Checkers", an NGO with branches at all big construction sites where it feeds and teaches the children of construction workers, the Rotaractors realised that most of the children had seen neither a school nor a classroom. Nor, for the matter of that, had they ever seen a film show.

The Rotaractors arranged to show a movie to the children and also attempted to teach them some nursery rhymes and to play a few interactive games with them.

When a quick quiz on "My country" was attempted, few children could answer the questions. This gave the Rotaractors an opportunity to make them aware of some facts about India.

They distributed sweets to all, especially those who learnt the answers quickly, and distributed fruits to the children.

Few children living at construction sites had experienced the luxury of eating fruits.

FROM ELECTRIC CARS AND CAMERAS TO MILK AND SUGAR

PP Kalpana Munshi, Chairperson of "Disha" and the Child Care Committee, made several donations to the Holy Name School at Colaba to benefit children from the less-privileged sections of society. In the course of a visit arranged on February 24, she gave a cheque of Rs. 5,000 for the purchase of educational toys, another cheque of Rs. 20,000 for the acquisition of percussion instruments for children's educational programmes, and Rs. 9,495 towards the cost of an LCD camera which will also be used for instructive purposes. Members of the Interact Club of Holy Name School and its Principal, Mr. Michel, interacted with Kalpana and her team, which included Shyamniwas Somani and Naresh Kumar Jain. Speaking of their individual desires and ambitions, most of the students said that they wanted to become doctors or engineers. But one girl wanted to become a police officer in order to ensure law and order.

Kalpana noted that most of the children were quite fluent in English and said that this would enable them to pursue their goals in life. She also enlightened them about the educational scholarships and other loan schemes of the Rotary Club of Bombay and told them that they could avail of these if the need arose.

Most of the Interactors were students of the Ninth Standard. At the other end of the spectrum were tiny tots from the kindergarten who had a great time "riding" the electric cars that had been made available to them.

In the course of another programme arranged soon after, Kalpana distributed milk packets, biscuits and sugar to 100 children from the less-privileged strata of society in the *bustees* (slums) of Baan-Ganga at Walkeshwar.

The parents of these children got together to thank Kalpana and the Rotary Club of Bombay for the services rendered by them.

More than 2,500 women took active part in a two-day programme arranged by Astitva Foundation, an NGO comprising women's self-help groups, on March 7 and 8.

The venue chosen was the sprawling Shyam Nagar grounds at Jogeshwari (East) and the occasion was International Women's Day.

A "Peace Rally" was organised on the first evening with the aim of creating awareness among women and other residents about Women's Day and the work done by self-help groups.

The rally wended its way through various slum areas of Jogeshwari and comprised girls in fancy dress attire. Approximately 2,000 women representing the SHG groups took part in the march, raising slogans about awareness and the rights of women.

This was followed by a cultural programme in which several women displayed their skills in singing, dancing and acting by taking part in skits and tableaux.

After the distribution of prizes, including the "Yashaswini" awards for successful women, prizes were given to the winners of some simple games of skill which had been organised earlier (on March 2, 3 and 4).
