Investing in Knowing Investments



ast Tuesday afternoon, Rotarians were privileged to witness a panel discussion between legendary stock market expert Bharat Shah and accomplished macro trends expert Manish Chokhani about the current state of the stock market and the prospect of investing in a seemingly mature bull market. Moderated by Rtn. Dipan Mehta, the discussion was an informative dialogue for the layman and a great conversation for stock market enthusiasts.

Mehta initiated the discussion by acknowledging the hesitation of some investors with regard to an oversaturated market, questioning whether

this worry was justified. Shah promptly denied the validity of their worries, stating the distinction between threats and concerns. The stock market isn't a place of a calm, serene existence - there are constant challenges; the threats need to be fleshed out and the challenges need to be dealt with. Alerting investors, Shah said, "Getting consumed by worries is inexcusable because every day brings new concerns and problems." Chokhani

added that the only time to be cautious is when investing in companies that are not well researched or understood.

Continuing the discussion with a question, Mehta inquired about the major risks that may not be quite visible in India's current bull market. Revisiting the last three decades of the country's market, Chokhani pointed out the ongoing problem of oil, inflation, fiscal deficit, and political issues. However, there have been no macro issues in this bull market, and companies have only compounded, creating enormous wealth creation opportunities for the country. The larger worry, he points out, is global. There may be something worrisome considering the imbalance in the GDP and the debt of other countries, and "if something pricks the bubble globally, we suffer from that." But in isolation, the country does not have many



concerns regarding its high savings rate, valuations, growing GDP, and the rich government, owing to its ability to privatise.

Concluding this question, Mehta discussed his belief: the bull market is quite safe currently, in comparison to past bull markets that were marked with scams and scandals, and this has increased investor confidence. Does this mean that the stock market has made progress and is safe and honest now?







With an enthusiastic 'yes,' Shah appreciated investors' long-term business acumen in contrast to investors of yesteryear, who lacked predictability about the economy. "Riding a rising boat because a tide is rising is a fundamentally flawed approach to participating in investing," he stated. Instead, Shah proposed a four-step solution:

- 1. Identify good businesses
- 2. Identify good people to run the businesses
- 3. Ensure that the business is atop a large size opportunity
- 4. Purchase quality franchises at a sensible price

According to the stock market expert, any market is theoretically safe if a capable analyst follows the above while investing.

The panelists were then asked to comment on the assumption that Indian markets are overpriced, due to listed companies presently having high P/E valuations relative to other emerging markets. Rejecting the statement that

the valuations are overpriced, the panelists justified them, as Indian companies have a higher potential for growth than their foreign counterparts like Japan.

To conclude the discussion, Mehta questioned the classification of large cap and mid cap investments and the justification of their usage. Shah challenged the notion of categorisation itself, urging investors to focus on the attributes that create value in the business, stating that it is "not only an intellectually bad

idea, but also a misleading one," much like the notion of not judging the book by its cover. It is, after all, the growth that matters.

Winding up with a refreshing round of rapid-fire, Mehta asked the guests of honour if they thought positively or negatively about businesses in various sectors, as well as future scenarios such the result of the 2019 elections and investing in Tata Steel - but that is classified for the attendees.

BRAND AND BRANDING 23 MAY 2018



Prand is NOT a product, package, offer or service, NOT a name, logo, package design, ad campaign or slogan. Brand is the sum of all associations, characterizations or perceptions in someone else's head regarding a specific offer (product, service, organization, etc.)

Brand is the promise and delivering the promise is branding
Simply put it - brand = identity & reputation identity is (what you say - name, logo, marketing, advertising) and reputation is (what you do - customer service, employee behaviour, product service performance)

Brand provides value to a business, better business perfomance, better revenue which builds brand value and equity for the organization.

When undertaking a branding program, it is important to understand the scope of what constitutes a brand and to determine what elements must be developed, optimized and implemented. Simply stated, a brand is the promise an organization makes to the stakeholders in its endeavors, while branding is aligning all the related stakeholder interactions

with the promise. This is contrary to the common understanding of a brand being focused on an organization's visual system (graphics, colors, type, photography etc.) only. The following schematic depicts each of the primary elements that may be included in a branding initiative.

Purpose | Values | Vision

Brand Vision / Core Idea

Visual System Naming Tone of Voice Interior Space / Sign Behaviour Service

The first step is to ensure that the purpose (mission), values and vision of success are clearly defined and / or relevant. For XYZ, the purpose is how they deliver value to its customers - in other words, what does XYZ do. The values are a set of beliefs that form the foundation of the organization. The vision is what the organization sets out to achieve over some period of time (typically a period of ten to twenty years). A robust vision is forward looking and most often includes three goals that bring clarity to the mission. Most importantly, the mission is the motivator for people to get involved in the effort.

Once purpose, values and vision (including goals) are clearly set forth the next step is to develop the brand vision / core idea. The brand vision becomes the foundation upon which all other elements of the brand are defined and designed including the visual system, naming, tone of voice, environment and service behavior

Prior to launching a branding initiative for XYZ, it is critical that the scope of the initiative be defined and a robust process be used for implementation.

Major Green Initiative by Environment Committee



The Environment Committee Of RCB Chaired by Rajesh Shah and guided by Director Madhusudhan Daga is on a roll.

This time around they have signed an MOU for a major initiative at the Museum.

Of the Rs. 50 lac sanctioned for this unique project Rs. 30 lac has been raised by a generous donation from Rtn. Manoj Israni.

A Memorandum of Understanding was executed by Rotary Club of Bombay, Rotary Club Bombay, Charities Trust No 3 and The Chhatrapati Shivaji Maharaj Vastu Sangrahalaya-CSMVS (formerly known as The Prince Of Wales Museum) in May 2018. The main objective of the MOU is to qualify for Platinium Certification which is the highest level of certification under Environment Management endorsed and awarded by the Indian Green Building Council (IGBC). Ecofirst Services Limited (A Tata Group Enterprise) are the consultants for the project and will advise and help in executing the following at the CSMVS Museum Complex at Fort, M G Road Mumbai 400001 to achive the desired certification.

- 1. Installation of Solar PV System. The additional capacity being added is around 35 KW.
- 2. Upgrading the Scroll Chiller System.
- 3. Augment current Rain Water Harvesting System.
- 4. To make provision for Sewage Treatment plant and Metering, etc,

RCB has agreed to support this project financially to the extent of Rs 50 lakhs. Launching, Branding and Publication rights for the project are accorded to Rotary Club of Bombay under the MOU. The full project implementation will take about 12 to 18 months. Upon receipt of Platinium Certification it will make CSMVS the first Museum in India to have been so acknowledged.



andana Shiva is an Indian scholar, environmental activist, food sovereignty advocate, and alter-globalization author. Shiva, currently based in Delhi, has authored more than twenty books. She is one of the leaders and board members of the International Forum on Globalization (along with Jerry Mander, Edward Goldsmith, Ralph Nader, Jeremy Rifkin, et al.), and a figure of the global solidarity movement known as the alter-globalization movement. She has argued for the wisdom of many traditional



practices, as is evident from her interview in the book Vedic Ecology (by Ranchor Prime) that draws upon India's Vedic heritage. She is a member of the scientific committee of the Fundacion IDEAS, Spain's Socialist Party's think tank. She is also a member of the International Organization for a Participatory Society. [6] She received the Right Livelihood Award in 1993, an honor known as an "Alternative Nobel Prize".
